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<p><b>What makes this subject special here?</b></p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Our History curriculum is deeply rooted in local heritage, enabling pupils to develop a strong sense of place and identity. We make rich use of local historical links, including Worle in WWII, Weston Woods and its role in D-Day preparations, the Victorian seaside, railways and smugglers, St Martin’s Church, and Viking and Saxon influences in Uphill and the Somerset Levels. Pupils also explore the wider regional significance of the nearby city of Bristol, learning about empire building, Brunel’s engineering legacy, and the development of ships, bridges and railways. In addition, pupils visit a local Iron Age hillfort, bringing prehistoric history vividly to life.</li> <li>• We are proud to be a Heritage School, awarded by English Heritage, recognising our commitment to exploring local history and uncovering the stories of the people and places that have shaped our community. This is further enriched through visits and workshops led by experts such as Michael Gorely from Historic England, who delivers engaging sessions on the Blitz, census records and Victorian life in Worle.</li> <li>• Where appropriate, history is taught in a cross-curricular way, strengthening links with both core and foundation subjects and enhancing learning through carefully chosen class texts.</li> <li>• To inspire curiosity and enthusiasm, we provide a wide range of memorable ‘wow’ experiences across all year groups. These include educational visits beyond the classroom—such as Wessex Water, The Matthew, local hillforts and museums—as well as immersive workshops delivered in school on themes including the Ancient Greeks and Egyptians, Romans, the Great Fire of London and the Rise of Baghdad.</li> <li>• As a school, we also actively commemorate significant national events, including Remembrance, royal milestones such as marriages, jubilees and birthdays, ensuring pupils understand their place within the wider historical narrative of our nation.</li> </ul>
<p><b>Accessibility for All</b> <i>pedagogy scaffolding, resources, enrichment, challenge, equity of access</i></p>		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Our History curriculum is carefully designed to be enriching, inclusive and ambitious, ensuring that all pupils are able to access, enjoy and succeed in their learning as young historians.</li> <li>• History is taught in a way that allows every child to actively engage in discussion, exploration and inquiry, regardless of prior attainment or ability. Lessons are structured to promote curiosity and critical thinking, with pupils encouraged to question the past and consider multiple viewpoints.</li> <li>• As historians, pupils understand that history is often a mystery; we cannot always know exactly what happened or why. This understanding creates a safe, non-threatening learning environment where answers are open to interpretation and discussion. This approach supports equity of access, as all pupils are valued for their ideas and contributions, rather than their written outcomes alone, enabling every child to participate meaningfully in historical dialogue.</li> <li>• Challenge is embedded throughout our History curriculum. High-quality questioning and rich discussion encourage pupils to think deeply and analytically, regularly exploring questions such as <i>how</i>, <i>why</i>, and <i>what if</i>. Through debate and reasoning, pupils are challenged to justify opinions, evaluate evidence and consider alternative interpretations of historical events. This ensures that all learners, including the most able, are continually stretched and engaged.</li> </ul>



		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Written outcomes are purposeful and carefully planned, recognising that historical understanding is not solely demonstrated through writing. When written work is required, appropriate scaffolding is provided to support lower-attaining pupils and those with additional needs. This may include adult support, word banks, sentence starters, visual prompts, timelines and structured writing frames. These scaffolds enable pupils to access the same high-quality historical content and learning objectives as their peers, ensuring fairness and inclusion without reducing ambition.</li> <li>• Enrichment plays a central role in bringing history to life. A wide range of visits, workshops and ‘wow’ experiences enhance classroom learning and provide memorable, hands-on opportunities to deepen understanding. These experiences are carefully resourced and planned to ensure all pupils have equal access, removing barriers to participation wherever possible.</li> <li>• Through this inclusive, well-resourced and discussion-rich approach, pupils develop confidence, resilience and a genuine enthusiasm for history. They leave with a secure understanding of the past, disciplinary skills, and the ability to think critically, ask meaningful questions and appreciate the complexity of the world around them</li> </ul>
